GRANTEE	COMMENTS
Massachusetts Justice Project	The primary source of non-LSC funding is from state IOLTA foundation grants. With 25% less funds available this coming year grant year, it is expected that our three IOLTA funded projects will take a hit. In addition to lay offs, remaining staff agreed to a 3% pay cut which is being implemented through 7.8 furlough days. This means that the program will close for 7.8 days above and beyond traditional holidays in 2012.
New Center for Legal Advocacy	We have operated with deficit budgets for the past three years and have exhausted any reserves available to subsidize a deficit budget. Three support staff also have been laid off. We have closed offices in two communities with substantial poverty populations. Clients in these communities often do not have transportation to get to our remaining offices.
Volunteer Lawyers Project of Boston Bar Association	As the primary funder of the region's intake/hotline program, we have had to greatly reduce the amount of the subgrant by over \$120,000 over the past two years, which will significantly impact western part of the state. Over the past two years, that subgrant has been reduced by 1/3, or over \$20,000. While we are projecting no staff reductions this year, we did not fill a staff attorney position that was vacated towards the end of last year due to the budget cuts. This was in an area of high volume (housing) in our program and it has put an incredible load on the remaining staff. This attorney was also Spanish speaking so we lost language capacity.
